Needham-based Nauset Construction has broken ground on St. James Place, a long-delayed 46-unit condominium complex in Cambridge's Porter Square neighborhood.

Acorn Holdings LLC is developing the project at 2013 Massachusetts Ave., a lot adjacent to St. James's Episcopal Church that houses an out-of-use car wash. The project will also feature 2,000 square feet of retail and an 11,400-square-foot parish hall that will house classrooms for children's programs, a library, a neighborhood food pantry and music practice rooms.

"This is really the type of project that we should be celebrating in our community," Cambridge Mayor Marc McGovern said in a statement. "Not only is it bringing much-needed housing to the community, it's bringing the (historic) garden out to the street so that everyone can enjoy it. It's also providing much-needed stability for this incredible congregation that means so much to the neighborhood and does so much to help those who are vulnerable. It really is a win all around."

Developers originally proposed St. James Place in 2008, according to a report from CambridgeDay. Several lawsuits from Cambridge residents delayed construction, the newspaper reported.

Site work on St. James Place is expected to begin this week. Architectural firm Dumont, Janks, Goldberg, Reed LLC designed the condominium complex.
